

Inverleith St Serf's 3-Manual Pipe Organ
Built by Rushworth and Dreaper 1931
Renovated by Principal Pipe Organs (York)
 -Console 2008
 -Soundboards, pipes and bellows 2014

Begun in 2008 with the installation of a new transmission system and upgrading of the console, incorporating a piston capture system, the renovation was completed in 2014 by Principal Pipe Organs of York.

New slider soundboards, underactions and bellows were fitted; the pedal and manual offnote chests and wind trunking were restored, the expression boxes were refurbished with new swell machines, and all 1528 pipes were cleaned and restored.

Built in 1931 by Rushworth and Dreaper of Liverpool, the organ is a fine example of the late English Romantic style. The renovation retains the tonal character of the original instrument, while modernising the wind supply and actions to make the instrument fit for the next eighty years.
